STATEMENT OF INTENT

At Ridgmont Lower School, our motto is *Learning for Life*, and in order for this to be fulfilled it is our intention that all children, irrespective of background or circumstances, should make good progress and achieve to the best of their ability across all subject areas. We recognise that not all pupils with an identified need are in receipt of pupil premium grant so we will use resources available to support their needs too (DfE Guidance, March 2022). We also recognise the barriers that prevent children from achieving their best. It is our aim to overcome those barriers through

- The provision of high quality CPD to ensure that pupils access effective quality first teaching
- The provision of targeted intervention and support to quickly address identified gaps in learning including the use of small group work and 1:1 tuition
- Targeted funding to ensure that all pupils have access to trips and first hand learning experiences
- The provision of opportunities for all pupils to participate in enrichment activities including, though not limited to, sport and music
- The provision of appropriate nurture support to enable pupils to access learning within and beyond the classroom, including well-being and behavioural support as needed
- To give free access to after school activities

Challenges

The Headteacher monitors attendance on a weekly basis. Parents are informed if their child's attendance falls between 90-96%. The attendance policy is on the website and holidays in term time are not agreed unless the circumstances are deemed 'exceptional'.	Reducing pupil absences will have a positive effect on achievement (UCL research)	2
Enrichment Activities (cooking, sewing, gardening, trips to venues to support learning etc)	Teaching children to cook encourages a healthier dietary pattern in adulthood alongside other skills such as maths and reading. Cooking along with sewing also encourages fine motor skills, resilience in overcoming a challenge and commitment to completing a project, self-confidence and creativity. (BBC)	1, 2, 3
